

Ethics at a Glance ENGAGING IN POLITICAL ACTIVITIES AND ENGAGING IN OFFICIAL EVENTS WITH CANDIDATES



ALLOWED

NOT ALLOWED

- + vote
- + contribute money to a campaign or party
- + attend political rallies and fundraisers
- + speak at a rally or fundraiser (unless a career SES)
- + run for office in a non-partisan election
- + run for office as an independent candidate in certain localities (including Washington, D.C. and its suburbs)
- + participate in a referendum campaign
- + display a political bumper sticker on a personal vehicle
- + allow a fundraiser in your home (which you attend as a guest) (unless a career SES)

- fundraise for a candidate or political party, including by:
 - forwarding/retweeting a fundraising email/tweet
 - "liking" a post that promotes donating to a party or candidate
 - inviting someone to a fundraiser
 - having your name appear on an invitation to a fundraiser
 - serving on a host committee
- engage in political activities when on duty (unless a PAS)
- use Government resources for political purposes
- engage in political activities when on Government premises (unless a PAS)
- use the authority of your Government position to influence an election
- run for office in a partisan election (other than as an independent candidate in some local elections)
- career SES only: assist a campaign or hold a position with a political party

PARTICIPATING IN OFFICIAL EVENTS AT WHICH A CANDIDATE IS PRESENT

You may participate in an official Government event at which a candidate is present (such as a Member of Congress running for reelection) only if:

- participation serves a Government purpose/supports an agency program or policy
- the candidate's participation is non-preferential (participation is not based on party affiliation)
- political/election matters are not discussed at the event

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
